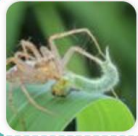
2. Identify and name a variety of plants and animals in a microhabitat

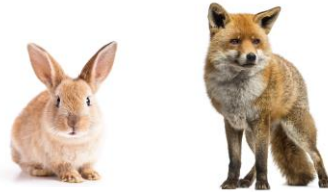

The grass is eaten by the rabbit.



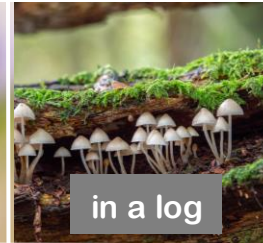

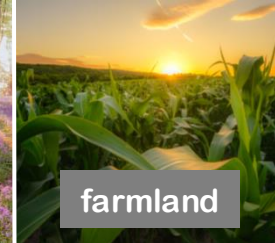
Dead or Alive

Rocket Words

reproduce	to create young, offspring or babies

producer	a plant at the start of a food chain
